The Washington State Native American Coalition Against Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault was founded in 2002, for Native women victimized by domestic violence and sexual assault. Since then, the coalition has grown to include issues affecting men, members of the LGBTQ2S+ community, elders and other vulnerable populations. We continue to work with the 29 federally recognized tribes in Washington state to build victim centered, trauma informed and indigenous community driven service programs that serve victims and survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault.

WomenSpirit Coalition believes that the greatest threat to tribal sovereignty is the pervasive and continuing epidemic of violence against indigenous women. Together, we can build strong nations that honor our traditional values and creates healthy families and communities.

Our Mission

Our mission is to promote tribal sovereignty by eliminating violence against Native women and promoting the well being of Native families and communities.

Violence Against Indigenous Women

According to the National Institute of Justice* statistics, Indigenous women are more than twice as likely to be assaulted in their lifetime, when compared to other racial and ethnic groups. This same study finds that men and individuals that identify as members of the LGBTQ2S+ community also face higher rates of interpersonal violence, as well as other types of assault crimes. This type of violence is pervasive and effects communities and families on every level. More work is needed to bring awareness to this epidemic and to develop tribal community-centered approaches to intervention and response.
